Male Black-capped Chickadees (*Poecile atricapillus*) sing for several minutes prior to dawn during the breeding season. In northeastern Colorado, dawn singing was associated with malefemale interactions rather than male-male interactions; males did not approach one another during the chorus. Males sang until female arrival, at which point they attempted copulation. During copulation attempts, males always uttered strings of *variable sees* and nearly always attached *gargles* to these strings. All *gargles* terminated in an acoustically similar, low-pitched, buzzy syllable.
