Project 3: Community Video Portrait Pre-production Planning

- Tools: Microsoft Word, pencil and paper
- Learn how to develop a written concept for a time-based production
- Learn how to create a scene-by-scene shot breakdown
- Learn how to create and use simple storyboards to plan and communicate production decisions

Due: 4-14-14

Description:

Pre-production is the planning phase of any time-based production. Activities such as developing a script, determining scene and shot breakdowns, and creating storyboards are all part of this planning process.

Working together with your project team, you will determine the best possible concept for telling a short (**1-2 minutes long**) video story about the community that surrounds Elon University. You will create a short written narrative describing the goals of your project, a simple scene/shot breakdown list describing all the necessary camera setups for creating your project; and create a simple set of storyboards that visually describe the camerawork and the action that happens in each of the setups in your various scenes.

Considerations:

- Write out your concept narrative in paragraph form (one paragraph per scene) as if you were verbally describing the story that you will tell using video
- With the shot breakdown list be thorough. Describe each unique scene AND each unique camera setup required to successfully communicate each scene
- With your storyboards, spend more energy and time on describing the framing and/or motion of the camera and the major actions happening in the scene than you do on the quality of the drawings

Content Requirements:

- 1. Pre-production materials for 1-2 minute video story about the community surrounding Elon Univ.
- 2. Each team's final story needs to incorporate aspects of each team member's concepts

Technical Requirements:

- 1. Concept narrative and scene/shot breakdown list should be created in Microsoft Word
- 2. Storyboards should be created with pencil and paper (using the storyboard blanks I provided)

Submission:

- 1. Copy of concept narrative (.docx or .pdf format)
- 2. Copy of scene/shot breakdown list (.docx or .pdf format)
- 3. A set of storyboards

Evaluation Criteria:

- 1. Story concept
 - a. Quality of idea (Is it interesting? Will the audience care? Can it be successfully told visually?)
 - b. Cleverness of how the camera is used to tell the story
- 2. Formatting
 - a. Concept narrative written in paragraph form
 - b. Scene breakdown written as a bulleted list
 - c. Storyboards created using drawing, diagraming and text notations to explain each shot
 - d. Effective communication thematic meaning
- 3. Craftsmanship
 - a. Free of errors and sloppiness
 - b. Attention to detail
